Balaam: Could He Ever Pray!

(Numbers 23:10)

Introduction: 1. Balaam was and Old Testament prophet who was torn by his allegiances.

- 2. On the one hand, Balaam wanted to serve God, but on the other he wanted to enjoy the pleasures of this life that could be bought with riches.
- 3. This conflict resulted in Balaam praying a very good, but strange prayer.

I. The Prayer Itself Was Very Good

- A. It was a realistic prayer.
 - 1. It recognized that death will come.
 - 2. (Ecclesiastes 8:8).
- B. It was an informed prayer.
 - 1. All know that death will come, but some fail to see the difference between the death of the righteous and the sinner.
 - 2. (Hebrews 9:27; Matthew 25:46; John 5:28-29).
- C. It expressed the most important concern that a person can have.
 - 1. Nothing is more important that dying right.
 - 2. (John 8:21,24; Mark 8:36-37).

II. The Prayer Was Strange Because Of His Divided Loyalty

- A. He had the wish but not the will (James 2:14-17).
- B. He had the desire but not the determination (Matthew 19:16-26).
- C. He wanted to be a saint in heaven, but didn't want to live as a saint on the earth.
- D. He prayed for the reward of the righteous, but he loved the wages of unrighteousness (2 Peter 2:15).
- E. He prayed for the riches of heaven, but had his eyes on the riches of this world (Jude 11; Matthew 6:19-21).
- F. He prayed for what God could give him, but wanted what Balak had to offer more (Matthew 6:24).
- G. He prayed that in death he would be numbered with the righteous, but in life, he was willing to be numbered with the wicked (2 Corinthians 6:14; John 18:18).
- H. He prayed for himself to be saved, but caused others to be lost (Numbers 31:16).

- 4. To die as a Christian, we must live as a Christian.
