Introduction:

- 1. Have you ever day-dreamed about finding buried treasure?
- 2. (Proverbs 2:4-5) There are some things worth pursuing more than even gold!
- 3. We've all heard the expression, "There are some things money can't buy."
- 4. In this lesson, I want to share with you one of those things that is a "treasure greater than gold."

1. Running To and From God

- A. When one thinks of running in the Bible, more often than not, they think of running as a response of man.
- B. Man is either running from God or he is running to God.
- 1. Joppa and Jonah (Jonah 1:3).
- 2. Joppa and Peter (Acts 10:23).

II. Consider the Value Of A God Who Runs

- A. Luke 15:11-32.
- B. The parable of the "Prodigal Son" has several applications.
 - 1. There's the angle of the prodigal son to consider.
 - 2. There's the angle of the older brother to consider.
 - 3. There's the angle of the father to consider.
- C. In considering all three angles, the point about the father "running to his son" might not get the attention it deserves (Luke 15:20).
 - 1. (Philippians 3:12).
 - 2. (Acts 7:55).

Conclusion:

- 1. Give thanks to God that He is a God who runs!
- 2. Someone needs to write a second verse to the children's song, "1-2-3 The Devi's After Me," and it ought to begin by saying, "1-2-3 The Lord is After Me!"
- 3. Do you need to return "home" today? If so, be assured that we serve a God who makes it easy to come home; a God who runs!
