Jesus Has Left The Building

Introduction: 1. If we desire to be followers of Jesus, we must leave the building.

- 2. God has always called people to a work to which he "sends" them.
- 3. That's not a throw off on what takes place here today, but it does emphasize the importance of "leaving the huddle."
- 4. But we often resist (Exodus 3:8; Numbers 16:13).
- 5. Let's discuss ways to get out of the building, by examining how the first century disciples did it.

I. They Hung OUT

- A. (Mark 3:14) Invited them to be with him that he might send them.
- B. (Acts 2:42-44; 4:32; 5:12-15; Acts 12:12).
- C. We need to spend more time in fellowship, prayer, and study.

II. They Were OUTspoken

- A. (1 Timothy 3:15).
- B. We need to be a moral voice in our community.
- C. (Philippians 2:15) There are many voices, whose voice will be heard?

III. They Heard the OUTcry

- A. They were compassionate.
- B. (Acts 4:32-37).
- C. (Acts 6:1-4).
- D. (Acts 11:29-30).

IV. They Changed their OUTlook

- A. They were ruined for this world.
- B. (Philippians 3:3-9).
- C. (Colossians 3:1-3).
- D. (Galatians 2:20).
- E. (Hebrews 11:10,13-16).

Conclusion:

- 1. Remaining in the building is not an option.
- 2. We must leave, following Jesus.
- 3. What if we stay? We will stop being the vibrant, living church of Jesus Christ, but instead will become a slowly decaying remnant of our former glory.
