## Skeletons In God's Closet?

(Jeremiah 10:1-10)

## Introduction: 1. As we near election time, we are also greeted with some "skeleton" dredged up out of someone's closet.

- 2. This skeleton is intended to be sufficiently shocking as to make the candidate unworthy of trust and holding office.
- 3. While we have grown familiar with this process in the realm of politics, it also occurs in religion too.
- 4. Some unbelievers in God, who think God is unworthy and undeserving of our trust and obedience, will "dredge up" what they believe to be skeletons in God's closet.
- 5. In this lesson, we want to examine three of these alleged skeletons and see if they are valid.

## I. Skeletons In Pagan Gods' Closets

- A. (Jeremiah 10:1-10).
- B. The prophet Jeremiah reveals several dirty little secrets that are true of pagan gods.
  - 1. They are man made.
  - 2. They cannot speak.
  - 3. They cannot move; they have to be carried.
  - 4. They cannot stand; they have to be propped up.
  - 5. They cannot hurt you nor can they help you.

## II. Does The God Of Heaven Have Skeletons In His Closet?

- A. Human Suffering
  - 1. God can't be all-knowing, all-powerful, and all-good and allow evil to exist.
  - 2. Suffering results from nature and free will.
  - 3. Furthermore suffering is not all "bad" (Psalm 119:71) It was good for me to be afflicted that I may learn your statutes.
- B. Foreknowledge
  - 1. If God knew man would sin before he created him, then wouldn't it be evil to proceed with creation?
  - 2. God did know (Revelation 13:8).
  - 3. Having the desire to love and be loved is not evil.
- C. Hell
  - 1. It's not right to punish a man eternally for a finite offense (Matthew 25:45-46).
  - 2. If so, is it right to reward a man eternally for a finite display of faith?
  - 3. What about justice? Rather than Hell arguing against God, I believe it's an argument for God.
- Conclusion: 1. God has not skeletons in his closet and upon examination is totally worthy of our trust.
