## **Another Night With The Frogs**

(Exodus 8:5-15)

Introduction: 1. The Bible is a remarkable book, and is able to help us see truths to which otherwise we would close our eyes.

- 2. While most of us are familiar with the 10 plagues God sent upon Pharaoh and the Egyptians, we sometimes read it as a historical narrative and fail to see ourselves in the story.
- 3. In this lesson, we want to look at one of the plagues, and examine a statement made by Pharaoh that we may be making as well.

## I. Background to the Plagues

- A. God had heard the cries of his people and determined to free them from slavery (Exodus 3:7-10).
- B. After several excuses (Exodus 4), Moses goes to Pharaoh and tells him to release the Israelites, but Pharaoh refuses (Exodus 5:1-2).
- C. Consequently, God was going to demonstrate who he was through the plagues and secure the release of his people at the same time.
- D. These plagues were not random, but direct assaults against Egyptian deities.
- E. Heqet, the Egyptian god of frogs was powerless and Pharaoh asked Moses to intercede on his behalf.
  - 1. Moses agreed and asked Pharaoh to name the time, and Pharaoh's response was foolish "Tomorrow."
  - 2. His response begs the question, "Why tomorrow? Why spend another night with the frogs?"

## II. Why Spent Another Night...

- A. Trying to atone for your sins?
  - 1. "What can wash away my sins?"
- B. Wrestling with guilt?
  - 1. (Psalm 103:12) Sins removed as far as the east is from the west.
- C. Fearing eternity?
  - 1. (2 Thessalonians 1:6-9).
- E. Living outside of Christ?
  - 1. (Galatians 3:27).
- F. (Psalm 39:4-5).
- G. (James 4:13-16).
