- 2. As we know, the church grew exponentially in the first century.
- 3. What gave them such tremendous success?

I. Who Preached to the Lost?

- A. (Acts 8:1-4).
- B. Notice who it was who scattered, preaching as they went.
- C. The early church did not leave evangelism up to a select group of Christians.
- D. You may not have all the answers, but if you are a Christian you know what one must to do be saved, because you've done it.
- E. (1 Peter 3:15).

II. What Was Preached to the Lost?

- A. Christ was preached (Acts 8:5).
- B. Jesus was preached (Acts 8:35).
- C. But note the content of this preaching.
 - 1. It wasn't just the person of Jesus, but the work of Jesus as well.
 - 2. The kingdom of God (Acts 8:12).
 - 3. The name of Jesus Christ (Acts 8:12).
 - 4. The response of baptism (Acts 8:12).

III. How Was the Gospel Preached to the Lost?

- A. Philip ran and overtook the chariot (Acts 8:29-30).
- B. He took the initiative (Acts 8:30).
- C. He began where the eunuch was (Acts 8:35).
- D. He gave him the correct information (Acts 8:36).

Conclusion:

- 1. The growth of the New Testament Church isn't due to some secret formula.
- 2. Rather, it's quite open and easy to replicate.
- 3. It doesn't require great buildings, high paid staff, or professional pulpiteers.
- 4. It simply requires that the church take to heart the command to go preach the gospel to the lost.
