(Luke 20:45-21:4)

Introduction: 1. One of the compelling storylines in the Bible is that its heroes are often the most unlikely, the least qualified, and the most like me.

- 2. Such is the case with today's account taken from Luke 20:45-21:4.
- 3. What I would like to accomplish in this lesson is for us to find the person with which our actions and attitudes most identify.

I. The Common Lessons Learned From This Text

- A. The widow gave.
 - 1. (Luke 21:2).
 - 2. The fact that she gave was a demonstration of her faithfulness and her desire to serve God.
- B. The widow gave sacrificially.
 - 1. (Luke 21:2-3).
 - 2. She gave all that she had.
- C. The widow gave more.
 - 1. (Luke 21:3).
 - 2. Our giving is not measured strictly upon how much we give, but also upon how much we have left.

II. The Uncommon Lessons Learned From This Text

- A. Shame on the Scribes.
 - 1. (Luke 20:46-47).
 - 2. The scribes were well off, yet they were taking advantage of the most vulnerable.
 - 3. They were allowing those with the least to fund the work while they enjoyed their abundance.
- B. She gave anyway.
 - 1. (Luke 20:45-21:4).
 - 2. She didn't rationalize an excuse for herself for not giving.
 - 3. The fact that they were abusing the funds didn't this widow an excuse not to give.

Conclusion:

- 1. As we examined this account and the parties involved, with whom did you most accurately identify?
 - a. The Scribes?
 - b. The widow?
- 2. If you don't like the answer to this question, then make a change. That's the point of Jesus' teaching in the first place. He calls us all to change.
- 3. If you are fine with your answer to this question, then keep on sacrificially serving your Lord.
