(Zechariah 7:5)

Introduction: 1. I don't suppose we preach a lot from the book of Zechariah.

- 2. For that matter, I'm not sure we spend a great deal of time in many of the "minor prophets."
- 3. However, the content of these books are just as timely to us today, as they were to their original readers.
- 4. In this lesson, we want to examine two repeated words that God made to his children "For me, for me?"

I. A Brief Background

- A. Judah has been in captivity for 70 years and now they are returning to Jerusalem from captivity.
- B. Their return home, and rebuilding of the temple has caused them to ask whether they should continue their self-imposed fast due to the destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonians.
- C. This is a good question since the temple was now being rebuilt.
- D. God's answer demonstrates his frustration and his awareness of their motives.

II. Why Do We Do What We Do?

- A. (Zechariah 7:1-6).
- B. (1 Samuel 15:22).
- C. Do we worship God for who he is, or for what he can do for us?
- D. Would we serve and worship him if there were no promise of Heaven?

III. Worship Without Holiness Is Vain

- A. (Zechariah 7:7-10).
- B. God wants worship from the heart, not out of empty ritualism.

IV. God Cannot Be Fooled

- A. (Zechariah 7:11-14).
- B. God is able to see why we do what we do.
- C. He knows when we seek to manipulate him.

Conclusion:

- 1. God is worthy to be praised and worshiped because of who he is.
- 2. If we think we can offer hollow worship while living unholy lives and somehow God will accept this, we are mistaken.
