(Hebrews 13:5-6)

Introduction: 1. I believe everyone wants contentment and fulfillment in life.

- 2. It's tragic to watch people desperately seek for contentment, and not be able to find it.
- 3. One of the great things about being a Christian is that one can find both contentment and fulfillment in simply being a child of God.
- 4. Paul learned to be content in whatever state he found himself (Philippians 4:11; 1 Timothy 6:8).
- 5. The intent of this lesson is to show you that the peace, fulfillment, and contentment you long for is at your finger tips.

- A. (Hebrews 13:5-6).
 - 1. Isn't it enough to know that you belong to God?
 - 2. That God will never leave you?
 - 3. That He is your helper?
- B. (Romans 16:23).
 - 1. How much do you value your standing in Christ?
 - 2. Are you content to simply be a "brother?"

II. Where Contentment Cannot Be Found

- A. Hedonism (Ecclesiastes 2:1-2).
- B. Intellectualism (Ecclesiastes 1:18).
- C. Materialism (1:13-16; 5:10).
- D. Ritualism (5:1-2).

Conclusion:

- 1. Solomon concluded his quest for contentment and meaning in life by saying man should fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole of man (Eccesiastes 12:13).
- 2. May we learn from Solomon's folly and find contentment in the fact that we are the Lord's!
