How To Stop Backsliding

(2 Peter 2:20-22)

Introduction: 1. All of us have probably known someone who surrendered their lives to Jesus, only to later quit following him.

- 2. It's a sad reality that is even worse than having never known the Lord (Luke 12:42-48; 2 Peter 2:20-22).
- 3. In this lesson, I would like to offer a solution to the problem of backsliding.
- 4. This solution is not the solution that most people offer, but I believe it is a far better solution to this problem.

I. Backsliding: The Reality

- A. (Jeremiah 8:5).
- B. (Hebrews 3:12-13).
- C. (2 Peter 2:20-22).

II. Backsliding: The Reason

- A. Most people suggest that the reason for backsliding is a lack of "follow-up" given to those who have obeyed the gospel.
- B. While I am not suggesting that "follow-up" has no place, I am suggesting that it has much less to do with backsliding as some may think.
- C. I believe the real problem is our preaching prior to one's conversion, not our teaching, or lack thereof, after one's conversion.
- D. We may be guilty of preaching a watered-down gospel that lacks the urgency befitting of the gospel and emphasizes the wrong things.
 - 1. A "Health & Wealth Gospel" is popular today.
 - 2. We may not be convicting people of their sinfulness.
 - 3. We may not be explaining the nature of God.

III. Backsliding: The Remedy

- A. Preach the word (2 Timothy 4:1-4).
- B. Make them see the desperate condition in which they find themselves.
- C. (1 Thessalonians 1:10).

Conclusion:

- 1. When one is taught what is at stake and convicted of their inevitable fate unless they turn to Jesus, they won't soon backslide, regardless of whether someone follows-up with them or not.
- 2. On the contrary, if you want to see more and more backsliders, convince them Christianity is simply about being a better person, having a happier life, and a better journey then when they see that isn't so, they will jettison their faith because it is useless or cumbersome.
- 3. The cure for backsliding isn't something that is taught after conversion, but before it.
