Postcards From Heaven

(Philemon)

Introduction: 1. The book of Philemon is a brief letter that Paul sent to a man by the name of Philemon.

- 2. Why would a personal letter be preserved and a part of our Bible?
- 3. I believe the answer to that question will become apparent as you see the great lessons contained in this short "postcard."

I. Paul's Prayer For Philemon

- A. (Philemon 1-7).
- B. Notice how Paul identified himself as a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and not Rome.
- C. Could it be that Paul accomplished more from a few years in jail than we have in a lifetime of freedom?
- D. Paul practiced what he preached with regard to prayer (1 Thess. 5:17).

II. Paul's Petition For Onesimus

- A. (Philemon 8-17).
- B. Paul makes it clear that he could have used his apostolic authority to command Philemon on behalf of Onesimus, but instead he petitions him.
- C. The demand of "Law" is good, but the appeal of "Love" is often better.
- D. Paul's petition for Onesimus is hard to refuse.
 - 1. Paul, the aged (v. 9).
 - 2. Paul, the prisoner (v. 9).
 - 3. Onesimus is now a brother (v. 10).
 - 4. Onesimus is profitable to you and me (v. 11).
 - 5. This could be God's plan (v. 15).
 - 6. You owe me (v. 19).
 - 7. I have confidence in you (v. 21).

III. Paul's Promise to Philemon

- A. (Philemon 18-25).
- B. If you desire, I will repay you whatever Onesimus cost you (vs. 18-19).
- C. By writing with his own hand, he offers a surety of his I.O.U.
