Judas: The Betrayer

(Matthew 26:47-49)

Introduction: 1.

- 1. There are a lot of ideas surrounding why Judas betrayed Jesus.
- 2. Some of these ideas almost make Judas out to be noble in his motives.
- 3. However, Jesus said it would have been better if Judas had never been born (Mark 14:21).
- 4. In this lesson, we will exam several passages concerning Judas and some concluding observations.

I. Passages Concerning Judas

- A. (Luke 6:12-16).
 - 1. Judas was a popular name, and Jesus' own brother was also named Judas (Mark 6:3).
 - 2. His legacy is such that nearly no one would name their child "Judas" today in the last 200 years there have been 481 boys named "Judas."
 - 3. Even Judas, the brother of Jesus, had his name shortened to "Jude."
- B. (John 6:67-71).
 - 1. Peter said "we" have come to believe and know you are the Christ.
 - 2. But Jesus said that one of you was a devil.
 - 3. Apparently, it wasn't obvious to the apostles.
- C. (John 12:4-6).
 - 1. Judas was trusted with the money bag.
 - 2. But he was a thief.
- D. (Matthew 26:14-16).
 - 1. Judas sought to betray Jesus for money.
 - 2. We now see his motive for the betrayal.
- E. (John 13:21-30).
 - 1. The disciples, including Judas asked, "Is it I?" (Matthew 26:22-25).
 - 2. Even still, they did not know it was Judas (John 13:27-28).
- F. (Matthew 26:47-50).
 - 1. They needed a guide to find Jesus.
 - 2. Remember, this was Passover, and the population of Jerusalem has swelled.
- G. (Matthew 27:3-10).
 - 1. Judas is remorseful for what he had done.
 - 2. So he hanged himself.

II. Lessons to Consider

- A. I'm amazed how Jesus guarded his words concerning Judas.
- B. No one can serve two masters (Matthew 6:24).
- C. Some of us sin against more opportunity than others.
- D. Association and discipleship are not the same thing.
