# **Our Imperfect Family**

(Mark 9:14:32)

- Introduction: 1. This evening's lesson is a follow-up to this morning's lesson.
  - 2. This morning we examined the need for Christ to be our life.
  - 3. But in saying that, I did not mean to suggest that perfection must be exhibited in our walk with Jesus.
  - 4. The process of salvation involves four big words: Mortification, Justification, Sanctification and Glorification.
  - 5. What we talked about this morning was the process of sanctification.
  - 6. Ills. receiving a card from Anne Marie with words and a drawing.
  - 7. Hopefully, in all of us, we long for perfection as followers of Jesus, but it alludes us.
  - 8. This imperfection robs some Christians of any joy and hope of heaven.
  - 9. Let's see how Jesus dealt with imperfection from his disciples.

## I. We See Imperfect Performance

- A. (Mark 9:14-18).
- B. The disciples failed at healing a young man, and the Scribes capitalized on it.
- C. They had many successes (Mark 6:7-13), but here they failed.
- D. When we fail, there will always be people around who will remind us.
- E. Jesus offers instruction (Mark 9:29)

### II. We See Imperfect Faith

- A. (Mark 9:19-27).
- B. The father freely admitted to his imperfect faith.
- C. Even John the Baptist (Luke 7:18-23).
- D. He was trying, but not perfect.
- E. Jesus granted his request despite his imperfect faith.

### III. We See Imperfect Knowledge

- A. (Mark 9:28-32).
- B. The disciples admit to not knowing why this happened to them.
- C. It's not necessarily a fatal mistake to "not know" something if you are actively seeking "to know."
- D. Remember we are disciples learners, and the Christian life is not an event, but a process of growth (2 Peter 2:18).

### Conclusion: 1. Are you imperfect? Yes! Of course, you are.

  - a. First, are you in Christ?
    - b. Are your imperfections committed as you pursue God.
  - c. Or, are your imperfections committed as you rebel against God?
