Introduction: 1. "David and Goliath" is not only a story recorded in the Bible, but it has become a modern-day slogan when an underdog defeats a greater opponent.

- 2. One such example was a basketball game played on December 23, 1982, between Chaminade and the University of Virginia.
- 3. In this lesson, I want to remind you of the power you have to pull of great upsets, and I want to remind you what you need to claim the victory.

I. Recoil

- A. (1 Samuel 17:26).
- B. David took offense at the blasphemy spoken against his God.
- C. (Jeremiah 36:24; Romans 12:9).
- D. We must learn to take offense at what dishonors God.
- E. How can we laugh at the profane, idolize the godless, entertain ourselves with what is obscene and claim to be disciples of Jesus?

II. Refocus

- B. We cannot allow another to rob us of our salvation.
- C. (Revelation 2:10; Job 13:15).

III. Remember

- B. We need to remember past times when God saw us through trials.
- C. Such remembrance stills our hearts, calms our fears, and gives us the courage to take on what may seem insurmountable.
- D. (Romans 8:31).

IV. Reliance

- A. (1 Samuel 17:45-47).
- B. With God, all things are possible (Matthew 19:26).
- C. Trust him even when you don't understand (Proverbs 3:5-6).
- D. (2 Timothy 1:12).
