Three Things About Baptism

(Acts 2:38)

Introduction: 1.

- In my years of preaching, I have found that people have more questions about baptism than they do the identity of Jesus.
- 2. We mustn't think that one who has questions about baptism is trying to find a way to skirt God's command.
- 3. Rather, many people are sincere seekers of truth and have been taught incorrectly and are unaware.
- 4. Therefore, let's talk about this tonight and equip ourselves to help others who are seeking the truth.

I. Baptism is an Immersion

- A. I am aware that there are several "modes" of baptism that are practiced today (e.g., sprinkling, pouring, and immersion).
- B. Without knowing a word of Greek, we can discern from our English Bibles which method was employed in the Bible.
 - 1. (Matthew 3:6, 16).
 - 2. (John 3:23)
 - 3. (Acts 8:26-40).
 - 4. (Romans 6:4).

II. Baptism is for the Remission of Sins

- A. Consider the nature of obedience (what, how, why).
- B. (Acts 2:38; 22:16; Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21).
- C. We must have faith in the "operation [working] of God" (Colossians 2:12).
- D. When we obey that "form of doctrine," we are saved (Romans 6:17).

III. Baptism is Not a Work of Merit

- A. (Ephesians 2:8-10).
- B. While works of merit or boasting are excluded from the salvation process, works of obedience are necessary.
- C. (John 6:28-29).
- D. Baptism is a divine condition to salvation, not a meritorious work.
